Interactive performances for our GCSE history students

Recently the year 11 history students visited The Doctors Show. and the Inquisition of Queen Elizabeth I, both are interactive performances that tell the story of the development of health and medicine, and Elizabeth I's reign directly related to their GCSE course.

The Doctors Show told the story of a thousand years of medical beliefs and practices, bringing to life the key events and people who shaped the understanding of medicine and the human body. Whilst Elizabeth I is put on trial various people they have studied come to either her defence or to see her convicted as a traitor.

As well as acting out different subjects for the students to see people they have studied come to life, the cast led the students in

workshops to help understand how these stories related to their GCSE course. They broke down exam-style questions, offering students advice on how they should approach these. The performers showed students past exam questions, then they








unpicked these together to help students see how they would receive top grades. The shows are a great way to bring the stories alive but also create an invaluable experience for students preparing for their exams in the summer.




World Book Day 2024


Mass in Blue

Mars Day at Alcester Academy

This week, a group of year 9 students took part in *Mars Day* as part of a STEM activity across the country. During the day, they had a live Q&A session with Tim Peake! The group also took part in a number of activities including a coding session for a rover to collect a sample from the planet Mars. This enabled them to



think logically and ask questions about computer programming careers. They made whoosh bottles with Mr Gaskell and tested these (as seen in the photo) these were very successful. This experiment demonstrates how much chemical energy is released from a small quantity of fuel whilst creating the bright blue flame and the whoosh sound. There was also time spent learning about solar energy and how this is used to power lunar rovers. They were then challenged to design their own battery powered rovers in small groups. It was a really interesting day for the students and hopefully gave them an insight into different careers within the different industries in STEM.



LEAVE OF ABSENCE DURING TERM TIME UPDATED INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

The Supreme Court clarified has clarified the law on unauthorised leave, including holidays, during term time (Platt v Isle of Wright 2017). The Supreme Court has made clear that attending school 'regularly' means that the children must attend school on every day that they are required to do so. As such, the parents of any child who is absent from school without authorisation for any length of time are likely to be considered as committing an offence under s444 of the Education Act 1996.

The regulations regarding Leave of Absence (The Education (Pupil Regulations) (England) Regulations 2006 as amended by Education (Pupil Regulations) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2013.) advise:

Head teachers shall not grant any Leave of Absence during term time unless they consider there
are exceptional circumstances relating to the application.

If the leave is granted, Head teachers are able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

It is for the Head teacher to decide what is 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. When making an application for Leave of Absence in advance parents are advised to give sufficient information and time to allow the Head teacher the opportunity to consider all the exceptional circumstances and to notify parents of their decision. It is advised that if the resident parent has not received notification or a response regarding the leave of absence application, it is their responsibility to ascertain if the leave is authorised prior to the start of the leave.

The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent ie the parent with whom the child normally resides.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Where a leave of absence is requested, but additional days taken either prior to or after the request may be considered as part of the leave of absence and could result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s).

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case-by-case basis and on its own merits.

Leave of Absences which are not made in advance cannot be authorised in line with legislation. This will result in the absence being recorded as 'unauthorised'. This may result in legal action against the parent, by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice. All matters of unauthorised absence relating to a Leave of Absence will be referred to the Warwickshire Attendance Service, part of Warwickshire County Council.

It is important to note, Fixed Penalty Notices are issued to <u>each parent of each absent child</u>, (for example 2 children and 2 parents, means <u>each</u> parent will receive 2 invoices in the amount of £120 each, totalling £240 for both children, this is reduced to £60 per child if paid within 21 days).

Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Fixed Penalty Notices are issued in accordance with Warwickshire County Council's Code of Conduct for Penalty Notices.
