



Student absence from school – missed education and remote learning provision

This guidance covers pupils who are absent or where the Academy has had to initiate a period of remote education.

Following an absence of longer than 3 consecutive days for a student, we suggest parents and carers acknowledge that their child need to begin catching up on school work *if* circumstances persist. We do appreciate that in some cases, children absent from school may not always be well enough to complete work.

Pupils have access to Google Classroom for all their subjects: it is recommended that pupils check whether there are resources and assignments available through this platform first.

The process above should also be followed in the case of emergency closures and unforeseen absence. In the case of absence affecting large groups of learners, teachers will upload relevant materials that support learning via Google Classroom, and are asked to conduct live lessons via Google Meet for years 10 and 11 where appropriate and possible.

The Academy website also still features long term plans for each subject (LTPs: <https://www.alcesteracademy.org.uk/quality-of-education/subjects>). Subject LTPs can be used to identify topics being covered that could be researched at home. As a new provision, we are launching our curriculum palettes throughout this academic year- these will offer a more visual understanding of key topics. All palettes will feature on the website and will eventually replace the LTPs. Pupils will have clear awareness on how palettes work at the Academy.

In cases of more persistent and long term absence, we consider cases on an individual basis. For example, teachers may be asked to assign more specific tasks via Google Classroom- this may include links to learning platforms such as Oak Academy to ensure the quality of work is adequate and allows children to progress (<https://www.thenational.academy/pupils/years>).

Please note that plans for any long term work will be agreed with the school, parents and the learner. Alcester Academy also has a bank of internal teacher recorded lessons that students can use for their English, maths and science learning should we feel this is suitable. Where funding allows and depending on the circumstance, some children may be offered more regular external tutoring.
