### GCSE?

- This June, you will opt for subjects to study during Key Stage 4 (years 9, 10 & 11).
- You must think very carefully about these options and discuss possibilities at home and also with your subject teachers.

# What are differences between Year 8 and GCSE?

- GCSE is a qualification. You have to disclose results to any sixth form, college, university, apprenticeship provider and in all future job applications.
- Workload You are expected to work hard during GCSE. Homework demands are greater and you must meet them to succeed. The Government has made GCSE courses harder, with more content. You will not cover the syllabus and meet deadlines without doing homework.
- Timescale You will receive 2 hours of teaching each week for option subjects.



## How is the course organised?

- 60% The Portfolio (coursework). This is the work that you will produce from September of Year 9 until December of Year 11.
- 40% The External Set Task (exam). This starts in January of Year 11. You receive the paper and have between January and Easter to plan and develop your preparatory work. The final piece to this project is completed over 10 hours (2 days) after Easter.





# Year 9 'Conflict'

- This project challenges your research and presentational skills in particular.
- You will cover a number of conflicts and will need to show the examiner that you **know** why/how they happened, those involved and the consequences on society.


You will then present the information visually, using a variety of materials and processes to hit as many GCSE assessment

objectives as you can.




## What's Conflict got to do with Me?

 This part of the project will allow you to investigate any historical links to conflict involving your family e.g. First/Second World Wars, Northern Ireland, Afghanistan etc.



• This evolves through the 'Conflict' project and will enable you to become more independent with your own investigations. You are given the opportunity to investigate different elements of the city e.g. fashion, architecture, sport, graffiti, crime, society etc.

Course overview:


50% External examination

## What qualities do you need to have **before** considering Art, Photography or DT at Key stage 4?

- Enthusiasm Do you love the subject? Are you willing to be patient and be resilient? Are you prepared to learn from mistakes?
- Ability Are you good at the subject? Do you have secure technical skills and are you still eager to develop these even further?
- Commitment Are you willing to develop work outside lessons, spending between 1 and 2 hours in your own time every week? What does your homework log/Google Classroom record look like?
- Research skills Are you prepared to research elements of the projects and prove YOUR knowledge (not copying and pasting information directly from the internet). Are you willing to write?
- Organisational skills Do you have qualities here? Are you organised, bringing your book and equipment to lessons? Do you always do your homework/remote classwork and are able to show how much time you've spent doing it?
- Responsibility Are you responsible for your own progress? Do you show
  interest in how well you are doing and take advice from staff about what
  needs to be improved? Do you act on the advice or ignore it?
